TOWNSHIP OF MACHAR MINUTES – REGULAR MEETING Monday, March 28, 2022

Call to Order, Disclosures of Pecuniary Interest and the General Nature Thereof; nil.

Council present: Mayor Lynda Carleton, Deputy Mayor Ron McLaren, Councillors Blair Flowers, Bart Wood and Neil Scarlett. Staff present: Clerk Administrator Brenda Paul and Treasurer Deputy Clerk Angela Loney. Staff scheduled Fire Chief Risto Maki.

New Announcement on Responses to Unincorporated Ontario

Ontario is supporting local fire services in the north with a new program reimbursing municipalities for fire services provided on crown land. The Ontario Government is launching a new program through the Northern Fire Protection Program to reimburse municipalities that provide protection services in parts of the province that don't fall under any municipal boundaries, known as unincorporated areas. Through this reimbursement program, the province is allocating funds to help northern municipalities recover costs associated with responses into areas without fire protection services such as search and rescue, medical, motor vehicle collision and property fires that are not covered by any other funding agreements. The Fire Chief advised through the authority of our Establishing and Regulating By-Law (Fire Dept), the South River Machar Fire Dept will be responding to Lount Township and the program is retro-active, already in effect (launching announced by the Ministry on Mar 19, 2022). Several questions and answers took place. Comments were shared that the incorporated municipalities continue to subsidize the unincorporated municipalities (other services, infrastructure and capital costs).

Firefighter Mandatory Certification

Changes are coming, despite our request for reconsideration and objection. The Fire Chief detailed the training commitment that will be required, indicating the current budget does not address certification, that the budget for 2023 will look significantly different. Fire Chief further advised the legacy clause for grandfathering current firefighters is not intended for full service departments and so it won't apply.

Any Budget Questions

Fire Budget is proposed at an increase of 4.15%. Fire Chief advised he attended a Budget Committee meeting with South River last week. Clerk Administrator inquired if Machar's request to lower the budget was referred at the meeting. Fire Chief advised no, but the budget was reviewed line by line and was chopped as low as he could get it when presented. Mayor inquired if the budget increase could be decreased from the 4.15% increase to 3%. Fire Chief advised with the removal of the accreditation item but this would affect taxpayers' insurance rates negatively. Council confirmed that would not be the item to remove. Fire Chief advised Budget includes \$20,000 from reserve to lower the budget, in addition to capital of \$55,000 from reserve. Councillor Wood expressed we missed the Chief's explanatory notes to the budget this year. Fire Chief advised there has been a change in process, and the explanatory notes will be coming forthwith. Fire Chief was thanked for attending and departed. Councillor Wood advised the firefighter mandatory certification training will most likely require the hiring of another person for the Fire Dept and so we'd be looking at additional costs of about \$100,000.

Fireworks inquiry reviewed. Council feel the wording is clear and no change is needed. Clerk Administrator advised we reviewed several other municipal fireworks by-laws when drafting. We believe the wording is meant to encompass any potential variation of the holiday dates. Further inquiry asks how Council is planning on educating visitors about the new fireworks by-law. Discussion ensued. Information is feature prominently on the 2022 Spring Newsletter and our webpage and information disseminated in the Community. Additionally, posters will be done.

Information provided: Township of Severn Council did not pursue zoning or licensing/have opted to strengthen regulatory by-laws (noise, parking, etc.), Bay Today article East Ferris plans to bring short-term rental by-law home by Apr end.

Mayor Carleton advised discussions on STRs at FONOM are contentious, Labrador and Newfoundland have made STRs commercial and required rezoning, indicating it's something to consider as they are businesses. It was agreed we need to put the time in to review and not make a snap decision. We should continue acting on problem STRs per individual incidents. Mayor and Council would like to invite input. Clerk Administrator suggested the 2022 Summer Newsletter.

a. Proposed 2022 Budgets

2022 Budget Worksheets for Arena and Fire reflected proposed increases of 32.08% and 4.15% respectively at our last meeting. Council requested lower drafts for this Council meeting. Drafts came back from South River at the same for Fire (4.15%) and a bit higher for Arena (32.23%). Discussion ensued on the proposed increases and responsibility to our taxpayers. Per our Resolution authorizing payment to South River, we need to have amounts approved by Apr 1. It seems the only choice we have is to keep our word as expressed to South River on Mar 9, 2021 in our reply to Mayor Coleman's statement: "Machar will agree to an annual renewal for a fixed term at an increase of up to, but no more than 3% each year." Our own departments are coming in for 2022 Budgets at 1.2% for Landfill and 2% for Roads. Recorded vote requested.
