7. Shared Services reply from South River; Arena Committee meeting

Further to Council discussion on Jul Arena and Fire Reports, South River Clerk Administrator thanked us for the catch on account and advised they're still gathering input as to how reopening can work, so until they have that feedback he doesn't think an Arena Committee meeting would have much value. Arena Draft Reopening Protocols updated as of Aug 4, 2020. User Group meeting held Sep 1, this isn't a Committee meeting just an opportunity to discuss the issues with the user groups. If Committee members wish to attend, they're welcome to participate. Summary of discussion from the Arena Users Group meeting, updated financial report and proposed ice contract for returning users received. South River Council would like to have a full discussion about the pros and cons of reopening with all members of Council and propose a Joint Committee of the Whole meeting for Tue, Sep 8 in the community hall at the Arena with Arena reopening being the sole agenda item. Email sent on the afternoon of Sep 3 and reviewed with attachments on the afternoon of Sep 4. Unfortunately, among several factors, it was just too short notice for us to call a meeting of Council on the Fri afternoon of the long weekend. South River Clerk Administrator advises the financial scenario falls in line with the previous budget presented in Jun and approved by South River. Machar Clerk Administrator confirmed there were no additional proposals to be presented. South River Clerk Administrator advised South River would proceed with the meeting and Machar representatives were welcome to attend. Councillor Bart Wood attended as a guest. Discussion ensued on the reopening of the Arena and the following recommendation was made; the Arena should not be considered open to the public but is available on a 3 month basis to the local primary youth user groups. Spartans and other groups can work with Village staff to comply and those requests will be forwarded to Council. Our cost for a Special meeting of Council is much greater than a Committee meeting, those available to attend, and scheduling of a Committee meeting is also much easier. It was felt an Arena Committee meeting would have been appropriate.

- 15. Township of Huron-Kinloss Resolution – Regarding a review of the Farm Tax Credit Program –**
The appropriateness of the cost of the Farm Property Tax Class Rate Program falling disproportionately amongst rural residential and business property owners when the benefit of an economically competitive agricultural industry and affordable food and agricultural products is a provincial objective that should be shared amongst all taxpayers in Ontario.
- 16. City of Port Colborne Resolution – Private member’s Bill 164: Protect Vulnerable Persons in Supportive Living Accommodations Act, 2019.** There is a need for regulating private supportive living accommodations to protect individuals requiring special care.

Residents may have an increased risk of contracting Giardia Lamblia (beaver fever). The Health Unit encourages residents of Carling Township who develop enteric symptoms such as diarrhea, abdominal cramps, bloating and fatigue to contact their health care provider and seek medical attention.

In 2018, there were 99 opioid-related emergency department visits and 14 deaths. 2019, this increased to 138 opioid-related emergency department visits and 18 deaths among the same geographical area.

AMO Policy Update – New Recreational Facility Guidance, Canada Healthy Communities Initiative and 2021-22 Connecting Links Program –** More spaces can open in sport, fitness and recreational facilities starting Aug 15, 2020 at 12:01 a.m., these facilities can have up to 50 patrons for each indoor sport or fitness room, while ensuring physical distancing of at least two metres. Federal Minister of Infrastructure and Communities, Catherine McKenna, announced she is making available \$31 million through a new program called the Canada Healthy Communities Initiative. This program seeks to help communities build on initiatives that are being used to adapt to the realities of Covid-

19. The program targets non-governmental organizations and community groups to partner with municipalities and identify projects over the next 2 years. 2021 – 2022 Connecting Links Program accepting applications, connecting links are municipal roads that connect provincial highways. The Province allocates \$30 million annually to support capital works on these roads and bridges, however, the Minister of Transportation allocated an additional \$10 million in 2019-20 as part of the COVID-19 Action Plan.

AMO Policy Update – Emergency Exercise Exemption, Child Care, Great Lakes Investments – The Solicitor General announced an exemption for municipalities from the requirement to conduct a mock emergency exercise in 2020. The provincial and federal governments announced an additional investment through the one-year Canada-Ontario Early Learning and Child Care Agreement (ELCC) of nearly \$147 million to Ontario for 2020-21. This year the funding will be used to mitigate against the impacts of COVID-19. The Ontario government is investing \$7.47 million to improve the health of the Great Lakes.

32. AMCTO Update – 2020 AMO Conference – Looked a little different this year; using multiple virtual platforms, pleased to report that we had an excellent delegation with Minister Clark. The Minister expressed his thanks to our members for their continued dedication and service particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, recognizing that municipal staff have been on the frontlines to ensure continuous service delivery – often done in new and different ways. Minister expressed his support for a number of these priorities and looks forward to continuing to work on these files, continued commitment to the Elections Ontario takeover of the Voters’ List but did not commit to a timeline for implementation, supportive of reducing the municipal reporting burden.

34. FONOM Media Release – Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) conference just finished, FONOM board were pleased to participate over the three-day event. FONOM board also had an opportunity to virtually meet Premier Ford’s cabinet members to discuss issues of importance to municipalities in northeastern Ontario, discussed the governance of OPP Detachments and the current five Health Units in the Northeast and once they transition, talked about promoting Northern Ontario economic development, with a post-pandemic lens as a healthy place to grow one’s business, also had a lengthy discussion about broadband. Even with the funding previously disbursed and the currently allocated funding, all agreed more is needed. No one community, association, or province will be able to tackle this issue. It is apparent the FONOM will have to join with others to work tirelessly together, to build a National Broadband Initiative. FONOM is an association of some 110 districts/municipalities/cities/towns in Northeastern Ontario mandated to work for the betterment of municipalities with the government in Northern Ontario to strive for improved legislation respecting local government in the north.

35. FCM Voice, Outlines Early Priorities for Budget 2021 – Canada’s COVID-19 recovery will require a bold and creative plan, driven by cities and communities of all sizes. That’s why, as part of the federal government’s annual pre-budget consultations, FCM has written to the House of Commons finance committee to outline how Budget 2021 can help build a more prosperous, resilient and connected Canada for all. Our preliminary recommendations include:

- Strengthening core infrastructure, tackling housing affordability and modernizing transit;
- Supporting municipal leadership on GHG reduction and climate adaptation;
- Moving faster to bring high-speed internet to every Canadian and supporting communities facing economic uncertainty.

The federal government has introduced a new COVID-19 resilience stream into its investing in Canada Infrastructure Plan (ICIP). From derelict industrial site to sustainable arts hub, Municipalities continue to find creative ways to make housing both affordable and sustainable. With support from our Green Municipal Fund, the City of Toronto transformed a century-old industrial site into a sustainable hub for the arts community with 26 units of affordable housing. Artscape Wychwood Barns was rebuilt into energy-efficient, sustainable live-work spaces for working artists, surrounded by park and skating rink.

42. **City of St. Catharines in Support to the City of Toronto** – Their legal challenge of the amendments made under Bill 184, Section 83, many residents without income supports face the reality of evictions under the Jul 26, 2020 amendment, in determining whether to exercise its power under subsection the Board shall consider whether the landlord had attempted to negotiate an agreement with the tenant including terms of payment for the tenant's arrears.
43. **North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit News Release - COVID-19 AND SCHOOL REOPENING – PUBLIC HEALTH INFORMATION FOR FAMILIES AVAILABLE AUG 25, 2020** – On Jul 30, 2020, the provincial government announced the September reopening of Ontario schools. In response to this announcement, the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit (Health Unit) has been working diligently with school boards to support a safer return to school. As part of this initiative, the Health Unit has created a guidance document titled *COVID-19 and School Reopening – Public Health Information for Families*. The document helps to answer many questions parents and guardians may have as they prepare their children for the return to school. *COVID-19 and School Reopening – Public Health Information for Families* will be available on the Health Unit's website on Aug 25, 2020 – two weeks prior to the proposed start of classes.

45. **North Bay Parry Sounds District Health Unit News Release – COVID-19 Outbreaks at School will be publicly Announced by Health Unit** – An outbreak in a school is defined as two or more lab-confirmed COVID-19 cases in students and/or staff in school with an epidemiological link, within a 14-day period, where at least one case could have reasonably acquired their infection in the school (including transportation and before or after school care). In line with routine COVID-19 case management, within 24 hours of the Health Unit receiving notice of a positive test, close contacts – someone who was at risk of exposure – of individuals who test positive for COVID-19 are contacted by the Health Unit. All school boards will be asked to create a COVID-19 advisory section on their new website. Where schools have websites, they will also be asked to create a COVID-19 advisory section . . . Notice of any closures of classes, cohorts or schools will be posted on school and school

board COVID-19 advisory sections. Parents who have questions about schools can speak to a public health nurse by calling 1-800-563-2808.

- 46. North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit Public Service Announcement – Updated Recommendations Regarding Close Contacts of Symptomatic Individuals** – When someone with symptoms is tested for COVID-19, or are isolating for 14 days, self-identified close contacts do not have to self-isolate. Individuals who self-identify as a close contact of someone showing symptoms are to self-monitor for symptoms of COVID-19. Individuals who have been in close contact with a confirmed positive case are reminded to follow the instructions of public health.
- 47. COVID-19 Update from Muskoka Algonquin Healthcare** – As of Fri, Sep 4, the Health Unit reported 718 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Simcoe Muskoka, there are currently no positive cases at either MAHC’s site. To date, MAHC has spent \$2.76 million on COVID-related expenditures. \$737,000 was spent in the 2019-20 fiscal year, and \$2,030,000 has been spent in 2020-21 as of Jul 31. Of the \$2 million spent this fiscal year, 94% is operating costs and the remaining is capital costs. Nearly all services have returned to hospital operations. MAHC’s Bracebridge Assessment Centre has been up and running for one week. Up to Sep 3, the centre saw just shy of 200 individual. Testing is by appointment only from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mon to Fri. Appointments can be made by calling 1-888-383-7009.
- 48. MAHC COVID-19 Assessment Centre Update** – To clarify and correct misinformation circulating in the community to foster a greater understanding of the COVID-19 assessment centre situation in Muskoka, the hospital’s core mandate is to provide emergency and acute care services at two hospital sites. They want to thank the many community members who have shown tremendous support to their hospitals during these difficult and challenging times. The fact is that MAHC has not been responsible for the operations of the COVID-19 assessment centres in Huntsville and Bracebridge since they opened on Apr 1, 2020. The Huntsville centre had been staffed and operated by the Algonquin Family Health Team and the Bracebridge centre had been staffed and operated by the Cottage Country Family Health Team. The Family Health Team were no longer able to provide this public health service in Huntsville due to their own operational challenges. Given the Family Health Teams were closing the assessment centres, and in the absence of other willing and able parties, MAHC stepped up to provide this public health service in Muskoka on hospital property at the South Muskoka site as it had an appropriate standalone outbuilding that could be retrofitted. - 49. AMO Policy Update – Orders Extended, New Direction Regarding Facilities** – The Province has extended its COVID-19 emergency orders for up to 30 more days, have been extended to Sep 22, 2020, Ontario Government is easing restrictions for facilities that rent out professional meeting and event spaces. Beginning Aug 21, 2020, facilities can have up to 50 guests for each indoor meeting room or event space with the facility. Outdoor meeting and event facilities remain subject to the 100-person gathering limit for the entire outdoor area. Capacity limits exclude employees or events personnel, new regulatory amendments have come into force requiring contact information for only one person in a party entering indoor or outdoor dining areas starting today, with exceptions. This is designed to reduce the administrative burden, while continuing to support case and contact tracing.
- 50. FCM – President’s Corner: Why collaboration is key to Canada’s recovery** – Recovering from this pandemic will require unprecedented collaboration. FCM has already begun laying out a vision for what a post-pandemic Canada could look like. That means raising people’s quality of life by renewing core infrastructure, modernizing transit and tackling house affordability. It means preparing for future shocks now by cutting GHG emissions and adapting to new weather extremes, and it means bringing people together by addressing regional economic disparities and moving faster to bring high-speed internet to all Canadians. Of course, the vision we’re laying out requires a modern approach to funding tools and authorities for local governments. So we’ll be ready to drive that conversation too.

Canada United Small business Relief Fund** – Will be managed by the Ontario Chamber of Commerce on behalf of the national Chamber network in support of other chambers and partners to help small Canadian businesses with their recovery efforts as a result of COVID-19, can be used for any of the following activities:
- Purchasing personal protective equipment (PPE) such as masks, face shields and latex gloves
 - Renovating physical space to adhere to local, Provincial or Federal reopening guidelines.

- Developing or improving e-commerce capabilities for your business.
 - Successful applicants will receive a relief grant up to \$5,000.
- 53. Canada Healthy Communities Initiative** – Will provide up to \$31 million in existing federal funding to support communities as they deploy innovative new ways to adapt spaces and services to respond to immediate and ongoing needs arising from COVID-19 over the next two years, will support projects under three main themes:
- Creating safe vibrant public spaces
 - Improving mobility options
 - Digital Solutions
- 54. Blue Sky Net** – Asked us to share their new COVID Technology Adoption Fund (CTAF), will provide eligible businesses, start-ups, municipalities, and Indigenous communities across Northern Ontario with access to capital grant funding to acquire digital technology and e-business and marketing solutions to ensure they can survive and adapt to the challenges presented by COVID-19. Capital grant funding for eligible applicants of up to \$10,000 with a minimum contribution of 25% from the applicant towards the project and Guidance and assistance for applicants. Eligible project types:
- Productivity
 - Financial Management
 - Social Marketing Solution
 - Collaboration & Learning
 - Customer Service
 - Mobile Working & Commuting
- 55. OEB** – Information about the **COVID-19 Energy Assistance Program for Small Business (CEAP-SB)**. A government of Ontario program with rules designed by the OEB, is intended to help small businesses and registered charities that are struggling to pay their energy bills as a result of the COVID-19 emergency. **CEAP-SB** provides a one time, on-bill credit to eligible small business and register charity customers to help them catch up on their energy bills and resume regular payments. Can apply for funding through their electricity and natural gas utilities or unit sub-meter providers (USMP's). Full program details including eligibility criteria, on-bill credit amounts and application processes are available at www.oeb.ca/CEAP
- 56. AMCTO Legislative Express** – As a result of COVID-19, the Provincial Government and the Ontario Legislature remained very active during Jun and Jul, with the Legislature rising for the summer later than usual. The Annual AMO Conference and Trade Show is now underway! In addition, we are happy to announce that we have secured a delegation with Honourable Minister Clark (Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing) to talk about issues that are top of mind to members including reporting burden, the municipal voters' list and onerous provincial processes. *Policy Spotlight COVID-19 Updates*; Ontario has seen a decrease in its number of total active cases and death rate allowing for the safe re-opening of businesses in stages as set out by the Ontario Government's Framework for Re-opening the Province. All Ontario regions have entered into Stage 3 as of Aug 12. Ontario's Declaration of Emergency came to a quiet end on Jul 24. To manage any ongoing risks and impacts of COVID-19, Bill 195, Reopening Ontario Act 2020 received Royal Assent on Jul 21. Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing information sheets on proxy voting and e-meetings, municipalities can now choose under certain conditions to utilize proxy voting and e-meetings (beyond emergencies) as long as these items are captured in procedural by-laws. On Jul 27, 2020 the Province announced \$4 billion in funding for Ontario municipalities through the Safe Restart Agreement. On Aug 12, the Province announced the allocation of Phase 1 funding. AMCTO continues to seek input from members on areas of burden. *Announcement*: ICIP changes for pandemic-resilient infrastructure.
- 57. NECO is Offering – Post COVID-19 Professional Services Relief Program. It provides up to \$5,000 grant for companies to access professional services – Eligibility:**
- A SME (Small, Medium Enterprise) ie. Retail shops, restaurants, corner stores, etc., and businesses of strategic importance to the community.
 - The applicant has attempted to access other relief federal supports and was ineligible or rejected (including CEBA, and AFI funding).

North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit News Release – Community Notice of a confirmed Case of Covid-19 at the Bay Street Café in Parry Sound; this individual worked on Sep 5, 2020 from 11 am – 2 pm while awaiting Covid-19 test results. The individual, who was tested and resides out of district, is an occasional staff member. Local contact tracing is underway by the Health Unit. Contact information for

patrons of the establishment on Sep 5 are not available. Individuals who ate at the establishment during this time are considered low risk, as per the Ministry of Health guidelines. These individuals are recommended to self-monitor for symptoms of Covid-19 until Sep 19, 2020 and contact the local assessment centre for testing, should symptoms develop. The Health Unit was made aware of this situation through concerned citizens and was able to confirm that the information was actionable by public health. Individuals are reminded to follow public health protocols, which include self-isolating if you have symptoms of Covid-19 and if you are waiting for Covid-19 test results. Restaurants and bars are reminded that they are required to keep a log of patrons for case contact management.

Request 2-025-20 to Noise By-Law to include Constant Repetitive Shooting

Neighbour concern received. Neighbour has contacted the OPP who has investigated and asked the property owner to keep in mind his neighbours peace. Neighbour advises By-Law Enforcement Officer says there is nothing she can do as it's not in the by-law. Neighbour indicates their animals, themselves and the neighbours surrounding the property owner do not feel safe. Neighbour is requesting to somehow add to the by-law a clause about shooting ranges and constant repetitive shooting to be prohibited totally. The By-Law Enforcement Officer has been monitoring the property to hear the gunfire and speak to the property owner. She received a call for noise from the property and attended. She spoke to the property owner about the noise and being respectful to his neighbours. The property owner indicated he would try not to shoot more than a day in a row in hopes to ease tension with his neighbours. Property owner states OPP viewed his backstop and shooting area were safe to continue. Discussion ensued. The properties are located in a rural area where this type of use is often desirable by owners and it's permitted in the rural area specifically because it isn't in an urban area. A by-law prohibiting such use would need to apply to all properties within a general area or time frame and unfortunately it just doesn't lend itself to a general application. There are many owners that use their property for this use. This seems to be a specific occurrence and hopefully the involvement of the By-Law Enforcement Officer has remedied the relation between neighbours. Clerk Administrator to reply advising By-Law Enforcement has intervened, investigated and hopefully assisted to resolve concerns.

Dog By-Law

By-Law Enforcement Officer has provided a draft. Further to Council review on May 11, discussions with the By-Law Enforcement Officer were requested. Unfortunately, we experienced a glitch with the teleconference system tonight. We tried to re-establish connection several times without success. This is a first time occurrence for the system. We use an outside supplier for this service and will review the issue with the supplier to source the problem. Council felt they would like more of a combination of the old by-law with the new draft, indicating they like the existing by-law but updated to include 4.5 from the new draft and indicated a running at large fine of \$50. The Clerk Administrator will advise BLEO.
